LABORATORIES

Under the *Public Health Act 2010* and Regulation, laboratories are required to notify the following diseases

URGENT: BY PHONE, AND IN WRITING (electronic or paper)

- Avian Influenza
- Botulism
- Cholera
- variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease (vCJD)
- Diphtheria
- Haemophilius influenzae type b invasive infections
- Hendra virus
- Hepatitis A
- Hepatitis E
- Legionella infection

ROUTINE: IN WRITING (electronic or paper)

- Anthrax
- Arboviral infection
- Brucellosis
- Campylobacter
- Candida auris infection and colonisation

NOTIFICATION MECHANISMS

Please initiate case notification within 24 hours of diagnosis

Notifications should be directed to the local Public Health Unit, except for:

- HIV, which is notifiable only by reference laboratories direct to Communicable Diseases Branch, NSW Ministry of Health.
- CPE and Candida auris should be notified within 24 hours directly to Communicable Diseases Branch by secure fax (02) 9391 9189.

Information specified in the Laboratory Notification Form must be provided in writing (either through electronic transfer, fax, or mail) as well as by phone for
